Clinical diagnosis is based on a group of signs and symptoms related to lower respiratory tract infection with presence of fever >38°C (>100°F), cough, mucopurulent sputum, pleuritic chest pain, dyspnoea, and new focal chest signs on examination such as crackles or bronchial breathing.
